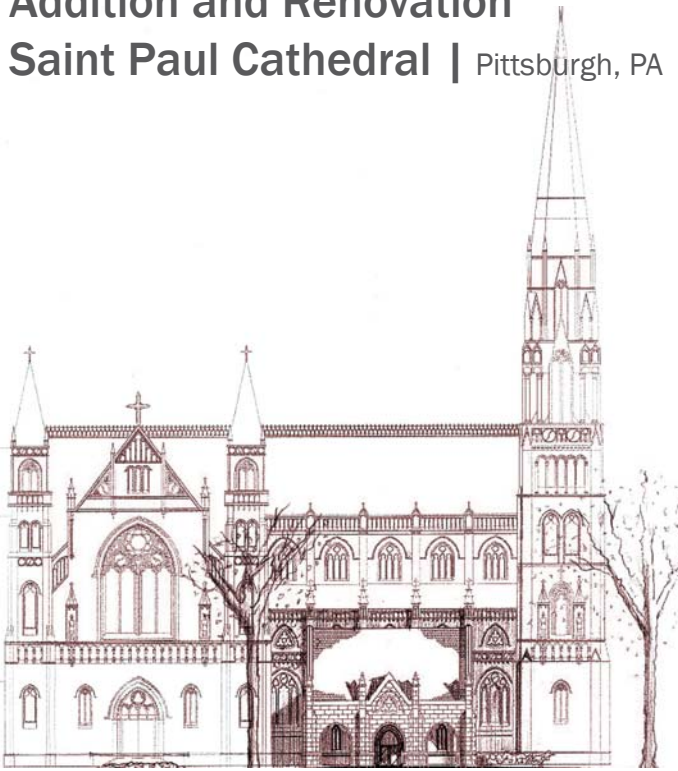




Addition and Renovation Saint Paul Cathedral | Pittsburgh, PA



A new addition and renovation to St. Paul Cathedral in Oakland for the Catholic Diocese of Pittsburgh was completed in September 2007. This imposing French Renaissance Cathedral was built in 1906 reflecting all of the Gothic traditions that Catholic architecture has followed for centuries.

The current project includes an addition on the west side of the building to accommodate a new vestibule, ADA access by elevator to the main floor of the cathedral and to the ground floor where the new parish hall will be built. This eloquent addition in the French Gothic style matches the architecture of the existing building and allows ease of access to the first floor and to the ground floor from the driveway adjacent to the building. ADA complaint rest rooms and interconnecting stairs are also included.

On the ground floor, we removed the existing construction and designed a new parish hall, two classrooms, and a new kitchen to service the parish community. The large hall is capable of seating 400 people for dining functions. Additionally, new ADA toilet facilities, cloakroom and other necessary requirements for meeting space is included.

New lighting and new air conditioning for the interior of this major religious building, were designed all in a manner sensitive to the Gothic architecture of the existing space.
